Long-time Council Members Retire

This fall the MD said farewell to two long time members of Council, Roy McLean (Division 2) and Terry Waddock (Division 4) both of whom decided to retire.

Roy McLean has been a consistent presence on Council for 21 years. He was first elected as Councillor for Division 2 in 1989, becoming Deputy Reeve in 1994 and served as Reeve from the spring of 2000 until his retirement. Roy's Deputy Reeve, Larry Spilak stated that, "As Reeve, Roy, together with his wife Lenore represented our MD with the class and the presence that set a new standard for our Municipality". Roy's class, gentlemanly nature, statesmanship and diplomacy are qualities that are mentioned again and again by fellow elected officials, administration and staff. He is also known for his dry wit and has been able to provide relief in many a tense moment through a clever comment.

Terry Waddock was elected to the MD of Foothills Council in the fall of 2001. During his tenure on Council he has served on many boards and committees including the Foothills Regional Emergency Services Board and the Calgary Regional Partnership.

Terry's ability to comprehend difficult situations and propose sensible solutions will make him difficult to replace. He has been a conscientious representative for the citizens of his division and a staunch defender of the things they hold dear. At the same time, he has shown great commitment to fairness and propriety. He has also been instrumental in the guardianship of the ratepayers' money, exercising great diligence in the allocation of municipal funds.

Through his position representing the MD of Foothills on the Calgary Regional Partnership, Terry devoted tremendous time and energy over the past several years to ensuring the interests of MD ratepayers would be represented in the development of the Calgary Metropolitan Plan. PLANNING DEPARTMENT

Highway 2A Industrial Area Structure Plan



Vision: to ensure socially, economically, and environmentally sound development opportunities for the residents and businesses that choose to locate in the 2A corridor.

On October 14th the updated and revised Highway 2A Industrial Area Structure Plan (H2AIASP) was granted 3rd and final reading by Council. H2AIASP is now a statutory document that will be referenced during application processes and when Council makes decisions on applications within the new plan area.

Some highlights of the new ASP include:

- an updated and expanded plan area of almost 8600 acres of land,
- more of a focus on collaboration with our urban neighbors in High River and Okotoks,
- the introduction of several economic, social, and environmental goals, objectives, and policies,
- alignment with the recently approved MDP 2010,
- agricultural transition buffer along the western edge of the new plan area.

Next steps to fully realize the goals, objectives, and policies set out in the revised ASP include:

- finalization and public circulation of the corridor's Design Guidelines,
- drafting of an Implementation Strategy for the plan,
- setting fees and levies associated with development in the corridor.

The process of reviewing and revising the H2AIASP started early in 2008, and since that time has benefitted from the continued contributions of residents, business owners, local and provincial agencies, and our urban neighbors. Without participation from these groups the revision of the H2AIASP would not have been possible.

Highway 543/498 Ave Extension

Construction of the new section of 498 Avenue, which extends access to Highway # 2 from the intersection of Highway # 543 and Highway # 2A, commenced in 2010. The project is scheduled for completion in 2011.

The initial step in the project is to pave from Highway # 2A up to the west side of the Highwood River. The next step is to construct a bridge over the river during the 2010 and 2011 winter period. The final step is to commence in the spring of 2011 and pave east from the bridge and tie into Highway # 2.

Riparian Areas within the MD

What is a riparian area?



A riparian area is land adjacent to a watercourse where the vegetation and soils show evidence of being influenced by the presence of water. . . .

Riparian describes an area of land located beside a river, lake or wetland. It is the interface between the land and the water. The word “riparian” is derived from Latin *ripa*, meaning river bank.

Riparian areas act as natural filter for sediment, nutrients, pesticides and other materials that run off the land into our rivers and streams. These areas are important habitats for aquatic and non-aquatic life. By protecting riparian areas, we are protecting not only the health of the river, but also the plants and animals that live along side the waterways.

Protecting Riparian Areas

The MD Foothills Land Use Bylaw currently requires that all development be set back 30 metres from the bed and shore of a water body. In order to ensure that the health of our rivers and wetlands are protected, the MD Council has approved guidelines for the use of the Riparian Setback Matrix Model (RSMM) on September 9, 2010. This model determines the necessary development setback by measuring the specific characteristics of the lands proposed for development. This is not a one size fits all approach. The model recognizes that the vegetation, slope and soil type of a riparian area influence the impact that development may have on a river. The model measures these various characteristics and the combined results determine the recommended setback.

Benefits of Healthy Riparian Areas

Riparian areas help reduce erosion, floods, stabilize streambanks, control and reduce the effects of pesticides, fertilizers, and sediment from the surrounding watershed pollution, and provide food and shelter for wildlife. They can help provide healthy fish habitat and improved water quality.

ASSESSMENT DEPARTMENT

How Assessments are Prepared

An Appraisal is an estimate of value. Assessors value properties in Alberta using a method called mass appraisal. Mass appraisal techniques allow assessors to accurately value a large number of properties in a short period of time.

Data Collection

Before an assessment can be prepared, property data must be collected. Sources of information are property owners, Alberta Land Titles, the real estate Multiple Listing Service and financial institutions. Detailed information about each property is also gathered by making on-site visits.

The assessors will visit all properties with building construction in progress, properties that have sold, newly subdivided parcels along with other purposes. As part of our requirement to re-inspect each property in the MD of Foothills every five years we plan to visit approximately 2000 properties this year.

With the number of inspections that need to be done each year, the assessors are unable to make appointments. We will arrive at your door unannounced in the hope that you may be home. In the event no one is home we will make note of any progress or changes visible from the exterior of the buildings.

The assessors will be driving MD Foothills marked vehicles and will have I.D. cards with them. We do inspections 12 months of the year. We encourage you to take the time to go over your assessment with them if they come to your house for an inspection visit.

TAX DEPARTMENT

Notice To Ratepayers

Annual Property Taxes were due by September 30, 2010.

- Taxes received after Sept. 30, 2010 are late and are subject to a penalty of 6%.
- Taxes received after Dec. 31, 2010 are subject to a penalty of 12%.

Save Money on your annual property taxes! Discounts for Early Payment of Taxes

Prepay your 2011 property taxes and receive a discount.

- **6% Discount** when estimated taxes are paid in full on/or before Jan. 15, 2011.
- **5% Discount** when estimated taxes are paid in full on/or before Feb. 15, 2011.
- **4% Discount** when estimated taxes are paid in full on/or before Mar. 15, 2011.

Discounts for Monthly Tax Installment Payment Plan (TIPP)

Pay your 2011 taxes in monthly installments and receive a discount:

- **5% Discount** if payment is received on/or before January 15, 2011.
- **4% Discount** if payment is received on/or before February 15, 2011.
- **3% Discount** if payment is received on/or before March 15, 2011.

AGRICULTURAL SERVICES BOARD

Brush Program

Agricultural Services for the MD are implementing the "brushing program" on MD right of ways. This will start November 2010 and go through to April 2011. The brushing crew will be working in District 2 and 3 and will be removing trees one metre past ditch bottom. They will remove brush and tree to fence line in problem areas. All wood is cut into fireplace lengths and stacked in the ditch, branches are chipped and the piles are also located in the ditch. Area residents are welcome to remove these piles of chips and wood for their own personal use.

Two brush mowers will be operating in Districts 1 and 7 starting November 2010 and ending April 2011. This will entail removing the brush from road edge to fence line.

PUBLIC WORKS

Snow Plowing



Motorists are asked to use caution when approaching road maintenance equipment as the operator's visibility is restricted.

Please contact the MD at 403-652-2341 to report a road that requires plowing. The public is not allowed to plow snow from a municipal road.

The MD does not plow private driveways. **DO NOT PLOW SNOW FROM THE DRIVEWAY ACROSS THE ROAD INTO THE OPPOSITE DITCH.** When clearing any driveway, please begin plowing at the road and plow in towards the parcel's property line. If you must deposit/pile snow in the ditch, please place it in the portion of the ditch next to the property line. **DO NOT** deposit/pile snow along the shoulder of a municipal road because it creates a significant hazard to the traveling public.

In the hamlets of Cayley and Blackie, it is the responsibility of the residents with fronting sidewalks to clear them off following a snow event.

having exceptional organization of the electronics, paint and tire collection areas as well as the overall state of the facility. The Compost Garden Party was a celebration of the landfill's success and a fun way to promote composting, gardening and community involvement with free food, live music and best of all – up to 100 kg of free compost for everyone at the party. Over 200 people attended this great celebration.

If you haven't been to the landfill recently, maybe it's time for a visit.

Landfill Hours of Operation

Hours of operation are Monday through Saturday, 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. (please arrive with enough time to empty your vehicle prior to 4:30 p.m.). The landfill is CLOSED on Sunday and all Statutory Holidays.

The Foothills Regional Waste Management Facility is centrally located on Secondary Highway 783 – approximately 3.5 miles south of Okotoks and Highway 7.

Landfill rates effective January 2, 2010:

- \$5.00 minimum charge for loads 0 kg to 100 kg.
- \$60.00/per tonne over 100 kg.
- \$90.00/per tonne for hard to handle garbage
- \$20.00 Freon removal fee per appliance plus tonnage fees.
- Please tarp all loads. There is a \$10.00 Surcharge for loads that are not tarped!
- Excessive rain may make access by 2-wheel drives difficult.
- Tipping fees are anticipated to increase as of January 1, 2011.

Salvage Centre

Located at the Regional Waste Management Facility, open the same hours as the Landfill. If you can't use it, perhaps someone else can. No fees to leave good reusable items at the Salvage Centre.

Recycling

On-site Recycling: Scrap metal, appliances, batteries, tires, used oil, propane bottles, antifreeze, oil filters, cardboard, appliances, wood waste & greens pile (compost), household hazardous waste. Tonnage fees apply. Pesticide containers – must be triple rinsed!

Transfer Stations

Transfer stations work on a \$2.00 per bag basis. Priddis Transfer station (264 St. W & 178 Ave, Phone 931-3266) is open on Tuesday and Saturday from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Black Diamond/Turner Valley transfer station (168St. W & 402 Ave, Phone 938-5224) is open on Friday and Saturday from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.

Bags for use at the transfer stations are available at: Millarville General Store, Hi Ho in Turner Valley, Esso in Black Diamond and at the Priddis Transfer Station.

Fire Department Changes to Fire Service Bylaw

New Fire Service Bylaw on Web

The Bylaw 17/2010 Foothills Fire Service Bylaw is now on the MD website at www.mdfoothills.com Anyone without internet access is encouraged to call 403-603-6300 for a copy of the new bylaw.

New bylaw to clear confusion over fires permits.

All outdoor fires require a fire permit with only one exception! No permit is required if the fire is totally enclosed within a non combustibile structure (burn barrel/ fire pit) that has the draft and smoke vents covered with a heavy gauge mesh screen that prevents the escape of burning embers and there is a non combustibile apron to prevent spread by falling sparks. There are restrictions for the size of a fire pit in Hamlets. For details please refer to www.mdfoothills.com.

Fire Bans

When the MD of Foothills declares a fire ban ALL OUTDOOR FIRES are prohibited. Before lighting any fire please check current a fire ban status at www.mdfoothills.com or calling the municipal office at (403) 652-2341.

Provincial Burning Restrictions

Under the Provincial Environmental Protection Act, products that create black, smelly or toxic smoke cannot be burned in fire pits or burn barrels. If you would not cook your marshmallow over it, then you are probably burning prohibited debris and could be fined under provincial regulations.

Fire Inspections

Fire Inspections on most commercial properties are on a 'complaint or by request' basis. Should you require a fire inspection please contact the MD of Foothills Fire Department at 403-603-6300.



Municipal Enforcement

Foothills Patrol



Overweight permits for commercial vehicles travelling through our area are now being handled through www.roadata.com or by calling 1-888-830-7623. Please view our web site for more details.

We have applied for a grant made possible by the Alberta Traffic Safety Fund that will allow us to purchase specialized traffic monitoring equipment. If we are successful, we will set the device up at different locations throughout the MD. This initiative will help the Patrol Division along with other agencies allocate appropriate resources to problematic areas and thus, hopefully curtail major traffic concerns.

The Cost of Fires

All fires will be invoiced. If you light a fire without a permit or allow it to get out of control it is deemed to be in violation of a condition of the bylaw, then the full costs of the fire suppression or attendance by the Fire Service will be assessed against the landowner. Having a permit does not exempt anyone from being invoiced if they fail to keep the fire under control for any reason. Any unpaid invoice will be assessed as taxes owing. Repeated false alarms may also result in an invoice if this occurs more than once a year. Lighting a fire or the failure to comply with required conditions can also result in a fine under the Bylaw.

Year One – A Review of the Shared Services Agreement

One year has passed since Ivor McCorquindale, Mayor for the Village of Longview made a presentation to the MD of Foothills No. 31 Council, requesting a partnership. This request received unanimous approval from the MD Council and resulted in the signing of a Shared Services Agreement with the MD to involve Administration, Planning and Development, Water and Wastewater Management, Technical Support and By-Law Services.

Mayor McCorquindale said, "The joint venture has been a tremendous success as it relates to the Village of Longview. The expertise and professionalism of the MD personnel working with our Council and staff has been beneficial to all, including our residents. As with any new enterprise there have been some teething problems, but working as a team, those issues have been resolved."

McCorquindale feels no doubt that the residents of Longview have benefitted from this venture and said, "The Village of Longview has been able to maintain their own autonomy, along with seeing a financial savings in both administrative and operational costs."

With the assistance of qualified MD staff, numerous Boards and Committees of Longview have moved forward in the past 12 months with projects that include the purchase of land and planning for a new wastewater lagoon system.
